
Balaam's Talking Donkey



Balaam invited the princes to stay the night. That night God spoke to Balaam and told him not to go with the princes and not to put a curse on the people of Israel because they are blessed people.






Again the donkey saw the angel and this time because she was walking between two walls, she threw herself against one of the walls and crushed Balaam's foot. Balaam hit his donkey again.
