
David Becomes the King

"King Saul begged me to stab him with my sword because he was hurt, so I killed him," lied the man. "I took his crown and the bracelet from his arm for you."




David wept bitterly. "Weren't you afraid to kill God's anointed?" he asked. Then he ordered one of his young men to kill the man.







The people from the tribe of Judah made David their king, but the rest of Israel made Ishbosheth, Saul's son their king.



The people that followed Ishbosheth had a long war against the people that followed David. Ishbosheth's side was getting weaker and weaker but David's side was getting stronger and stronger.




King Ishbosheth had an argument with Abner, the commander of his army. "That's it! I'm going to help David become the king of Israel!" promised commander Abner.




David told Abner that he could join him on one condition, that he send his first wife Michal to him. She had married another man. The new husband followed behind weeping as he watched Michal go away.
