


Moses told Aaron everything that the Lord had told him. Together they went to the leaders of the people of Israel and told them what God had said.




Moses also showed the people of Israel the miracles that God gave to him. The people believed. They bowed their heads and worshipped.

The Israelite work leaders were beaten because the people could not make enough bricks. "Why are you treating us, your servants, like this?" they asked Pharoah.




"You people have too much time because you are asking to go and worship the Lord. Now get out! No straw will be given to you and you must make the same amount of bricks!" answered Pharoah.
