
Gibeonite Deception


"Could you give us some water and bread?" asked a weary voice. "All of our bread is full of mould. We have been traveling for weeks and weeks."




Joshua and his men looked at the weary travelers. They were sure that these strangers must have been traveling for a long time because their clothes were ripped and even their shoes were held together with patches.



"We are ambassadors from a far away country and far, far away in our country we heard about your God," said the men. "You heard about our God?" asked Joshua.




