
Saul becomes King







Then Samuel told him what would happen on the trip home and it happened exactly. First two men met him telling him that the donkeys were found and that now his dad was worrying about him.




Then he met three men. One carried three baby goats. One carried three loaves of bread and one carried a bottle of wine. They gave two loaves of bread to Saul.
